PROJECTS AND PARTNERSHIPS 2023



The Zambia Climate Change Network (ZCCN)has continued to participate in the UNFCCC processes both as part of official Zambian delegation as well as part of the global Civil Society fraternity. This directly provides space for the Network to contribute to the global debate and effort necessary to combat the effects of global warming which is resulting into climate change. Through this engagement, ZCCN contributed to the development of Zambia's Nationally Determined Contributions that culminated in the finalization of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change.

The Network has identified itself as a member of the Pan African Climate Justice (PACJA) which epitomizes the African coalition of climate change response affirmative actions. The Network membership to PACJA provides an important and strategic continental alliance to meet the growing challenge of climate change.

At regional level the Network remains engaged with COMESA, the African Unions (AU) and the Southern African Development Community (SADC). In recent

times links have been identified and forged with other climate change Networks in the region through joint actions and sharing of information and space for engagement. This commitment is envisaged to be sustained and enhanced through this strategic plan.

At national level the Network contributed to the development of environment and climate related policies that include, the National Climate Change Response Strategy, the National Climate Change Policy, NAPA, REDD+ and the National Forestry Policy.

Following the participation in the development of the Zambia National Climate Change Policy, the Network continues to serve on the National Climate Change Technical Committee as a strategic linkage for the civil society.

The secretariat is pleased to announce that 2023 has started with standing and new projects, and we are excited to share some of the progress we have made with our various partners.

Firstly, we are pleased to announce that international organizations in the climate change space have continued to work with us on various projects. These partnerships have enabled us to achieve our objectives and make a significant impact on the lives of communities in Zambia.

One of our star project is dubbed Galvanizing and Unifying Africa's Actions for Resilient Development (GUARD), which is under the Pan African Climate Justice Alliance (PACJA). This project is set to run until 2025, and we are already making great progress towards achieving its goals.

SIAVONGA DISASTERS



On December 14, 2022, Siavonga District was hit by a destructive storm that left the communities reelina from its effects. Houses, shops, and a school were destroyed, causing significant economic losses for both individuals and the government.

The negative consequences of climate change on human societies and the environment were keenly felt in the already climate change prone communities.

Recognizing the gravity of the situation, the Zambia Climate Change Network (ZCCN) took it upon themselves to visit the affected communities in Siavonga District to appreciate the extent of the damage and how the situation was being managed. They were accompanied by Mr. Given Kwapu, the Chairperson of the Siavonga District Council, who expressed his concern over the impact of climate change on the district.

Mr. Kwapu highlighted the destruction of critical infrastructure, which had caused economic

losses for both individuals and the government. He emphasized the need for concerted efforts to address the damage on homes and schools.

ZCCN's Partnerships and Advocacy Officer, Mr. Simon Mwamba, echoed Mr. Kwapu's sentiments, emphasizing the critical nature of the matter. He called for a collaborative effort to support the affected communities, who were particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change. Mr. Mwamba emphasized that Loss and Damage is another critical matter that arises from such calamities. He urged the government to make use of existing international climate change policies to support these communities adequately.

The visit by ZCCN was an essential step towards recognizing the impact of climate change on communities and advocating for support for the affected individuals. It is essential that we take the necessary steps to mitigate the effects of climate change and support vulnerable communities in the face of such disasters.



VCA 2022 HIGHLIGHT STORY

As the year 2022 came to a close, Zambia Climate Change Network (ZCCN) reflected on the achievements of the Voices for Just Climate Action (VCA) Project in the Nanyanga community forest reserve, located in Chief Sikoongo's area in Siavonga District, Southern Province.

Led by their community coordinator, Mr. Edson Munsanje, the locals of Nanyanga have taken a significant step in engineering locally-based solutions to safeguard their forest and entire ecosystem. These solutions are entirely based on local knowledge and expertise, which is a testament to the importance of involving communities in climate action.

This has been a massive win for the community as they strive towards sustainable development while preserving their heritage.

Stephen Chansa, the chairperson of the forest committee, has witnessed the remarkable work the community is doing through the VCA project. He commented, "We are delighted to see the community taking such a proactive role in the protection of the forest. Their efforts will go a long way in ensuring that future generations can continue to benefit from the ecosystem services provided by the Nanyanga forest."

The Nanyanga community has been actively involved in preserving the forest by promoting sustainable forest management practices such as community-led patrols, reforestation, and conservation of wildlife. Faides Maki, the head woman of Hamuzya village, welcomed the ZCCN team to Nanyanga forest reserve, where they toured the forest and visited the Nanyanga hot spring, a site that the community holds dear. She praised her community's efforts in safeguarding the hot spring, which is now viewed as their heritage.

"We are proud of the work that the community is doing, and we are committed to preserving our heritage," the head woman said. "The Nanyanga hot spring is part of our culture and tradition, and we are determined to keep it alive."

The visit to Nanyanga in December 2022 was an excellent opportunity for ZCCN to review and celebrate the community's achievements and to encourage them to continue with their efforts in safeguarding the forest.

Just as we ended our 2022 implementation year on a high note, we look forward to the 2023 implementation year with great anticipation. The community-led efforts towards sustainability and climate action in Nanyanga forest reserve are inspiring, and ZCCN is committed to supporting them in their quest for a better future.

During the meeting, the team discussed the use of INTERSEC's real-time public warning systems, which answer to emergencies such as floods, wildfires, and many more.

INTERSEC's innovative and disruptive tech solutions are being used in Europe, the Middle East, Asia-Pacific, North America, and Africa. As an organization, ZCCN believes that the collaboration with the firm, as well as the partnership with the

Government of the Republic of Zambia through the Ministry of Green Economy and Environment, will be a game-changer in the emergency warning systems in the country.
